



Yachats Weed of the Month – January 2020

Montbretia/Crocoshmia (*Crocoshmia x crocosmiiflora*)

Impact: Crocosmia is a small genus of flowering plants in the iris family, originating in southern and eastern Africa. Several varieties are found in cultivation, the most common being an orange hybrid form, often called montbretia, that has become highly invasive in various parts of the world. This is the one that can be seen flowering along roadsides around Yachats in August. Montbretia is very adaptable, growing in both wet and dry locations. It grows from underground corms, and readily escapes from cultivation by forming new corms a short distance from the parent plant. It rarely spreads by seed. Once montbretia forms a dense clump, native plants are totally excluded. Other less problematic varieties of crocosmia include “Lucifer”, a tall form with brilliant red flowers that attracts hummingbirds and deer. If you absolutely must have crocosmia in your garden, this one is a good choice as you will be providing food for the local wildlife. There is also a golden-yellow form that you might consider.



Identification: Crocosmia leaves are sword-shaped. The attractive orange flowers of montbretia seen in midsummer are unmistakable – see photo alongside.

Management: It requires a lot of persistence to eliminate montbretia. Each plant forms multiple corms that must be dug up and disposed of, but some of them are very small and it is virtually impossible to find them all at once. You will need to revisit the area every few months for several years, and deal with new growths as they appear. Be careful to properly dispose of all plant parts, otherwise it is easy to inadvertently create a new colony.
