Mayor's Message

My wife and I recently had to have several alder trees removed near our house. They had reached an age and condition that threatened our safety and our home, but seeing them come down grieved us. They were the perches for birds, the filters of sunlight, the binders of earth, healing soil chemists, and impressive and majestic beings in their own right. Two of them were Yachats residents long before any of the rest of us were. In an environment like ours where alder trees grow abundantly and quickly they are often taken for granted, even demeaned. I've heard them called "weeds". I've heard them declared old and past their prime at an age when even a man would be considered young.

But I consider them heroic. When devastation of any kind creates a hole in the forest, alders mobilize to begin the repair. There are two areas on the ridge south of town that are a little different color than the rest of that ridge. Those are logged over areas that were denuded within the last 15 years or so. The leaves of alders have bandaged the visual wounds and allowed the forest to begin to heal under their veil. In time they will be shaded out by hemlocks and spruce, their jobs done, their time over.

Plants that fill holes in that way are frequently referred to as "volunteers". They are not planted

like seedlings destined for harvest forty years hence. They just show up to do a job. Though alders are not the tree-of-choice for commerce or for construction, they march forward where they are needed and they fill the holes without boast or fanfare.

We are a village rather than a forest, but I think there are parallels. A forest needs all its parts to function well, and when a hole is created it needs its volunteers to patch it up. We need all our parts to function too. We need the businesses, the service organizations, the care-givers, and the people who maintain and provide the infrastructure. When there is work to be done, a hole to fill, we need someone to step up and fill it. Often times, particularly in small town government, those holes get filled by volunteers. They stand tall, they gather energy from the sunlight that surrounds them, and they do what needs to be done.

I freely admit that I am an optimist. I tend to expect good outcomes. I tend to look for the good in the situation, in the person, in the tree. I look around me and I see a lot of strong and healthy Yachatian alders, volunteering, filling a hole, sheltering the weary, getting the job done. I see a bright future for a healthy forest around us and a healthy village that is us.



This year we will be observing the harmonic convergence of a 50th and 100th anniversary of both the city's incorporation and naming, respectively. Our name changed from Oceanview to Yachats in the year **1916**, and the City of Yachats was incorporated in **1966**. A great opportunity for a year-long educational party!

The Little Log Church and Museum will be providing a good amount of the resources to help with this



community project. Our theme will be a general history of the Yachats area. Local businesses have been invited to display photographs of Yachats in the "old days", and other visual examples of how we have evolved. There will be

Last year's burn permits expired June 1, 2016 and an inspection is required prior to issuance of the 2016-17 permit, so please contact us at (541) 547-3266, before using your Yachats fire pit. Yachats Public Library

Some Library patrons don't get deeper into the stacks than the New Books section at the front of the Library.

Unfortunately, they are missing the

fascinating reading to be had from the books on the shelves toward the back of the main room. So, for summer reading adventures, explore our non-fiction section. To give you an idea what awaits you there, we offer brief descriptions of a few of the most popular:

The Big Burn, by Timothy Egan, is the story of the great fire which destroyed about three million acres of the forests of Washington, Idaho, and Montana in 1910. The nation's shock at the death and destruction from the fire helped Theodore Roosevelt convince Congress to save the U.S. Forest Service from cancellation. The big burn established public land as a national treasure in the minds of American citizens.

Dancing in the Streets: A History of Collective Joy by Barbara Ehrenreich describes the joy of life expressed in communal rituals of dance and celebration. Her examples include such diverse cultural subjects as cave drawings, weddings, religious rites, healing, war preparations, and the modern "carnivalization" of sports celebrations. Her book is a catalog of optimism and happiness within groups from a variety of cultures, from various time periods. Might make you feel like dancing.

Empty Mansions: The Mysterious Life of Huguette Clark and the Spending of a Great American Fortune by Bill Dedman and Paul Clark Newell, Jr., is a biography of heiress Huguette Clark (1906-2011), daughter of copper baron William Clark (1839 – 1925), one of the wealthiest men in the world. The book chronicles both William and Huguette's life, including Huguette's decision to live the last 20 years of her life inside New York City hospitals, despite owning multiple estates and a fortune worth more than \$300 million. After she died at the age of 104 in 2011, her fortune started a greed-ridden legal battle.

Grandma Gatewood's Walk: The Inspiring Story of the Woman Who Saved the Appalachian Trail by Ben Montgomery. This is the biography of Emma Gatewood who was the first woman to hike the entire Appalachian Trail alone, as well as the first person—man or woman—to walk it twice (three times, in all). She set out in 1955 at the age of 67 without telling anyone, wearing tennis shoes and carrying a small bag containing food, a coat, and a shower curtain. And then she became a celebrity! A fascinating, uplifting story.

Nomads of Western Tibet: The Survival of a Way of Life by Melvyn C. Goldstein and Cynthia M. Beall. This is a fascinating description of the nomads living at altitudes exceeding 16,000 feet on Changtang Plateau in Western Tibet. Designed to serve as both an ethnological study and a coffee table book, *Nomads...* contains spectacular photos recording an exotic way of life.

Packing for Mars: The Curious Science of Life in the Void by Mary Roach. As you prepare for your non-stop flight to Mars, many questions will pop into your head: What happens to your body in that weird environment? What happens to your mind? And what about hygiene? The author is well-known for her humor and non-stop curiosity. In this book, she delves into space travel issues no one else would have the nerve to touch.

The Pine Island Paradox: Making Connections in a Disconnected World (The World As Home) by Kathleen Dean Moore. A former professor at Oregon State University, Dr. Moore is one of the most widely-acclaimed philosophers in the world. In this book, she uses a series of deceptively simple stories to convince the reader that humanity is inherently connected to its environment. Her book is insightful, eloquent, and surprisingly witty. You'll never forget Pine Island.

Lab Girl by Hope Jahren. An autobiography of a botanist, this book is full of surprising insight about trees and about people. Jahren provides many anecdotes about her odd fieldwork, her unconventional relationship with her lab partner, and her difficulties with a bipolar disorder. Also, she marvels at the elegant little miracles of plant life. And she does it all with humor.

The Thing with Feathers: The Surprising Lives of Birds and What They Reveal About Being Human by Noah Strycker describes how birds are similar to humans and how they differ. For example, Strycker tells about the amazing intelligence of the Clark's nutcracker (first described by William Clark of "Lewis and Clark" fame). This corvid nests high in the Rockies during the intensely cold winter. You'll need to read the book to learn how it survives in very much the way a human would survive.

Travels with Charley in Search of America by John Steinbeck. Nobel Laureate Steinbeck's classic memoir describes a journey he made throughout the U.S. in 1960. Knowing his death was imminent, he made the 10,000-mile trip in a camper (named Rocinante after Don Quixote's steed) and accompanied only by an insightful poodle named Charley. Steinbeck's observations of his nation are given in part through imaginary conversations with the dog.



City Council Briefing

At their meeting on June 9, 2016 the Yachats City Council took the following actions:

- Adopted Capital Improvement Plan for 2016-2017 thru 2020-2021.
- Adopted City Budget for 2016-2017.
- Adopted a Declaration on Human Rights and Climate Change.
- Adopted Resolution No. 2016-06-05 Establishing Line of Succession for Governance in the Event of a Disaster (added City Administrator to Line)
- Adopted Resolution No. 2016-06-06 Establishing the Persons Authorized to Issue Emergency Declarations (because of adding City Administrator to Line).
- Adopted an Ordinance to remove the requirement that BBQ grills be inspected and a burning permit issued before use.
- Agreed with the recommendation of Parks and Commons Commission to place signs requesting no dogs inside the fenced playground area behind the Commons.
- Adopted an amendment to Administrative Policy No. 5 Donations and Recognition Policy.
- Adopted a policy regarding when City Staff will perform Notary Services.
- Voted to put a measure on the November Election Ballot for a 3% tax on any potential recreational marijuana sales.
- Heard updates on an alternative site for south water tank project and on Hwy 101 Improvement Project.
