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## Mayor's Message

When I was first encouraged to run for mayor I was somewhat reluctant. I was concerned about what I didn't know. I knew my background had

prepared me for the job in a very unique way. As an executive in a parks managing agency, I knew quite a lot about managing water systems, sewer systems, streets, trails, public safety and facilities management. I had served in leadership roles for years and had some pretty well honed management and supervision skills. More times that I can count I've been in front of a group facilitating public process, consensus building, and information gathering and decision-making. I had worked with the vagaries and nuances of government all my adult life. What I didn't know, since I hadn't been involved in Yachats local government, was the lay of the land in terms of the agendas (hidden and overt) of the people and organizations in town.

Don't get me wrong. I know the term "hidden agendas" sometimes has a negative connotation. I do not mean it negatively. I simply make the observation that all of us have agendas...things we want to make happen or things we want to be sure to avoid. In some cases we are reluctant to reveal those agendas until we've had the time to set the stage so that others can understand our

point of view. We hide our agendas not with malice or purpose of evasion so much as to be sure that our ideas get a fair trial. Further, sometimes our agendas are organic. They are innate. They live so deeply inside us that we may not even recognize their existence. They are hidden even from ourselves. They are often so deeply hidden that they may even clash with our concepts of integrity (ours or other's). A leader with no sense of those agendas can easily lose the ability to guide process effectively.



After being mayor for a while I developed a handle on many of the perspectives of the community and its organizations, and a realization that on any given topic new agendas will reveal

themselves. Personal biases will reveal themselves. And again, I don't use the term "bias" in any negative way. We all have biases that we have adopted for good and sufficient reason. Somewhere in the mix of biases, agendas, and pure hearted intentions is the right decision for the health and well-being of our village. The trick for a mayor and a city council is to find the balance point.

I often use this newsletter space to brag about my town...your town. If you find that boring, you should stop reading now because I have new praise for you.

The City Council has been struggling with an issue, a concept, an idea, for a couple of years.

As we've cleaned up some problem areas in our licensed transient rental program to minimize negative impacts on neighbors, neighborhoods, and on visitors, we have wondered if there is a point when there would be too many vacation rentals in town. Is there a point when a neighborhood ceases to be a neighborhood and becomes a business district...a spread out motel? Is there an overall number for the whole city that, once reached, changes the character of the town negatively?

As we've considered this issue and watched it, we've observed the number of vacation rentals increase sharply. The trend is upward and it's steep. Consequently we decided it's time to focus on the problem or potential problem to try to reach the right decision, that balance point, that protects the character of our town while serving visitors who want to stay in homes, and the property owners and management agencies that offer that service.

So we held a Council meeting with just that one topic and invited all who were interested in the topic to give us their thoughts and ideas about this issue. As you can imagine the meeting was well attended and the thoughts ranged from "There is no number that's too high", to "You should put an immediate cap on the total number".



Here's the bragging part: Although the biases and agendas ranged from protection of income, to protection of property values, to

protection of quality of life, and were often diametrically opposed to one another, we had a civil and productive discourse on the topic. Views were expressed respectfully. A large crowd of people listened to each speaker attentively. And although there was an occasional edge on the bias that was expressed, it never crossed a line to animosity. There seemed to be a realization that the purpose of the meeting was in fact to find

that balance point rather than to crowd out one view or the other.



There was a representative of a business that manages vacation homes in the meeting to observe how it went. Although that business has property they manage in Yachats, her particular venue is in another town. She came up to talk to me after the meeting and made this observation: "Yachats is nice". Although she obviously could have meant that the setting is attractive, the houses are appealing, or the businesses are interesting, what she was saying is that we had just taken a good look at a contentious issue where disparate agendas and biases clashed and nobody was mean spirited. We did it nicely. The people of Yachats are nice.

It's too early to say what, if anything, the Council will decide on this issue. We have more information to weigh than we did before this discussion. With your help we will continue to look for that point of balance. Thanks for being nice.

Everyone in the community is invited to participate. Each year the number of participants grows and each year the ivy recedes a little more ground. Oh - and did we mention that all volunteers receive passes to use the Overleaf's spa facilities for a day as well as a chance to win gift certificates that are good toward a variety of spa treatments? ## **YIPSI! (Yachats Invasive Plants Subcommittee) News**

June's pretty, but none-the-less dastardly Weed of the Month is Hedge Bindweed, often called Morning Glory.



Hedge Bindweed is a tenacious perennial twining vine that blooms from June to September. The stems are up to 12 feet long and can form dense tangled and destructive mats as they intertwine with any and all vegetation they encounter. In the Yachats area bindweed is widespread and often grows in conjunction with infestations of blackberry.

Digging the plants out by the roots is more effective than hand pulling. Either way, the process should be repeated at least three times a year (early growing season, mid-summer and late summer) for at least three growing seasons. Don't try to compost any plant parts containing roots. Bag them for disposal.

### FIZZ, BOOM, READ!

Kids are out of school mid-month and on June 24<sup>th</sup>, we will start our annual 8 week, free Summer Reading Program for children 4-12 years of age.

The program this summer *Fizz, Boom Read!* is focused on the science which underlies many aspects of our daily life. We'll take a look at kitchen science, simple machines, weather, color and light. And because this is Yachats, we'll throw in wave technology and many art projects.

The program will be Tuesday mornings from 10am till Noon. For the first hour kids gather at the library for storytelling and book selection. They will then walk to the Commons for an experiment (spoiler alert, there is a volcano coming), project or activity. Adults pick up their kids from the Commons at Noon and a light, mostly healthy snack is provided. We are able to offer this program thanks to an OR State Library grant. Children keep track of their reading (or being read to) throughout the summer and earn both weekly incentives and larger prizes when they meet their reading goal. Many of the prizes have been donated by the Ladies Club again this year. The OR College Savings Plan teams up with the program to offer a \$529 college scholarship to a lucky child and provides our final week's entertainer, Christopher Leebrick, national award winning storyteller.



### Milo Tickles the Ivories for a New Kitchen Stove

Milo Graamans, local musician extraordinaire, will perform a benefit concert at the Yachats

Commons on Sunday, June 29<sup>th</sup> at 2 pm. His repertoire includes classical to contemporary and always includes one or two rousing ragtime numbers. We can truly claim Milo as one of our own. He was born and raised here - performing his piano music for us in this Yachats community since he was only a few years old. We have been fortunate to witness his growth as a performance musician. And as of late, we have watched his growing involvement with local theatre productions. Most recently, he has written and is currently producing a musical production at the Performing Arts Center in Newport.



Milo has agreed to partner with the Friends of the Commons to produce this piano recital as a benefit for a new stove in the Commons Kitchen. The new stove/oven will replace our older unit which the Friends purchased some 15 years ago. Proceeds from this concert will be used as a 'match' to a grant which the Friends will write to fund this project. A similar event a couple years ago (which Milo participated in), resulted in the new upright freezer which now serves us in the Kitchen.

This event fits nicely into the mission of the Friends of the Yachats Commons Foundation - a 501(C) 3 organization that works to do programming and fundraising to enhance the Commons facility. It was in the early 1990's when the building transition took place which turned the former Grade School into our Commons Community Center. This is the same time when "the Friends" organization began.

Back then, the room that is now the kitchen had only a small eraser sink in one corner of what had been a classroom. I remember an early Friends fundraising event that served a sit down meal in the Multi-Purpose room. Food was prepared at the Lions Club, Ladies Club and one of the Churches and brought to "Room 5" where it was plated and served. Fundraisers like this one - and many others to follow - generated the needed funds to change the "one-sink classroom" into what was to become our present day commercial kitchen. Most recently the Friends

acquired a \$10,000 Grant from the Oregon Community Foundation. Part of this grant funding was used to purchase and install a new countertop and cabinets in the kitchen.

Hats off to Milo for his ongoing willingness to hold hands with the Friends of the Commons and to collaborate in these activities to enhance the Commons facility and the community that surrounds it.

### **Crosswalk Safety Laws:** With Yachats'



summer tourist season almost in full swing we all need to take more care when driving through town. Both drivers and pedestrians should take the time to understand the fundamental laws regarding crosswalks—

doing so helps lower the risk of unwanted accidents.

Remember, under Oregon law there is a crosswalk at every intersection.

Do not pass a vehicle stopped at a crosswalk. A stopped car may be a clue that a pedestrian is crossing.

When stopping at an intersection, do not block the crosswalk. This forces pedestrians to go around your vehicle and puts them in a dangerous situation.

Pedestrians move at different speeds. Be alert for children who may suddenly dart into the street. Be

patient with older adults who take extra time to cross the street.

Be alert for people or animals during lowlight conditions, especially in areas where they are likely to cross the road, or you might not see them until it is too late to stop.
