





Burgundy Featherkile's spoof on a 1950's-style horror film premiered at the Yachats International Film Festival—a bit of a spoof itself. The gala event was complete with wine, tuxedos, red carpets (or at least a series of reddish throw rugs), costumes, and appearances by all the stars. There wasn't a headache in the house. Yet we've come to expect it and we weren't disappointed. The stage at the Commons featured performances from polka dancing to a dog act. That's right, polka *and* a dog act! There was

singing, dancing, joking, a puppet show featuring Webkinz (which is apparently sort of a cyber-beanie

baby...kinda sorta), and playing of various musical instruments. Like the performances in the movie, it wasn't always strictly professional. It was, however like the movie, all good.

It has been said that the Mayor's and the City Council's job is to handle the headaches for the rest of the Yachatians. That may be true. After all, we're not making a movie but rather attempting to make a livable town. The Council is certainly the place that problems come for resolution. Sometimes resolution is easy and sometimes it is, in fact, a bit of a headache. 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City Council News

- The City Council adopted Ordinance No. 290 at the

April meeting amending the Nuisance Section of the Municipal Code to add wording related to “stalled” construction sites. The amendment will provide the City with a tool to deal with construction sites that have become unsightly due to debris, mud, standing water, overgrown vegetation, open ditches, or uneven bare ground either through an abatement procedure or through the Yachats Municipal Court system.

- After inspection by the Public Works Director and recommendation by the Public Works & Streets Commission, the City Council dedicated Windsong Street as a city street and it was accepted for City maintenance.
- A prefabricated outdoor notice board for the Amanda Trail was approved for purchase by the City Council. The sign will provide a temporary solution until the Trails Committee can design and construct a custom interpretive sign for the trail. The Confederated Tribes will provide the wording for that sign.
- City Council approved the conceptual plan for the trail between the southeast corner of the Gerdemann Preserve and the Fistera Garden development. In addition, they allocated funds for the Environmental Impact Study required, contingent upon approval of the concept by the U.S. Forest Service. The trail, which will cross Forest Service land, will provide a connection between the City’s trail system and the 804 Trail.



Public Works Department

If you haven’t already seen a somewhat different-looking piece of City equipment around town, you will.

With the Public Works and Streets Committee’s recommendation and the City Council’s permission, the Public Works Department purchased a second-hand Vac-Con® catch basin sewer cleaner truck.

This piece of equipment is used to clean and unclog sewer mains and storm drain culverts with a high pressure “vac jet.” With up to 3000 p.s.i. available, it is able to scour and clean pipes. The vacuum portion of the truck is used to suction out sewer manholes and storm water catch basins. The vacuum system has an eight-yard debris container that allows operators to stay in the field longer without removing debris, and the “jet vac” onboard has almost 1000 gallons of water that at full power lasts about 20 minutes.

The Public Works Department is pleased to have such a valuable tool; we feel it should serve the City well.



Volunteers Still Needed for Task Force

Choice #1 Stay in my home with my humans and tuck in my tail and hope we are not harmed.

Choice #2 Go to the human shelter and beg them to let me in with my owners even though no pets are allowed in people shelters.

Choice #3 Beg my humans (before I even have to answer this question) to join the Domestic Animal Disaster Preparedness Task Force where they can help the City plan ahead for my safety, get free Dog and Cat First Aid/CPR and FEMA training, and help the community get educated and prepared for a disaster.

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**Tsunami Siren Test
Schedule Changes**

In order to avoid confusion, the Oregon Legislature has adopted a new rule for standardizing the schedule for testing tsunami warning signals. For those of us who are familiar with the weekly or monthly tests in South Lincoln County, the day of the week and the time will change to meet the new standard.

The new test schedule will commence on Wednesday, May 5, 2010. Both Seal Rock Fire Protection District and the Central Oregon Coast Fire and Rescue District 7 (Waldport) will test each of their sirens Wednesday at 11 a.m. Yachats Rural Fire Protection District will test their siren monthly on the first Wednesday of each month at 11 a.m.

Little Log Church and Museum

One Tuesday last month volunteer Dan Dolan reported he greeted a visitor who happened to be a descendant of Sophie Mitchell, who ran the Yachats Post Office and grocery in the early 1900s. Our visitor enjoyed touring the museum and was able to identify several people from some of our old photos.

This stirred my own curiosity about post office history in Yachats, so decided to research our post offices over the years. I found some articles from the 1987 South Lincoln County News, written by Cornelia Lovejoy, who was a regular correspondent for the newspaper as well as a volunteer at the Log

Church. She reported on the plans for a big centennial celebration commemorating the opening of the first post office in our little town.

Did you know that the post office was originally known as the Ocean View Post Office and established on November 5, 1897? The name was changed to Yachats in 1917 when Lincoln County was formed. Until the Pacific Coast Highway was built in the mid-1930s, mail was carried via mail coaches down the beach from Waldport as the tide permitted.

The Little Log Church has photos of the mail coaches "beating the tide," as well as framed pictures of past Yachats post offices. Previous locations of post offices include a building just up Yachats River Road (now a private residence), and the space where Mr. Bill's is now.

It was fun perusing the old scrapbooks. If you are curious about what was happening in Yachats in the last century, you are invited to do the same.


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Even though the birds appear to beg for the food, unless it is part of their regular diet, it will do them no good at all. In fact birds that are fed large amounts of bread get a condition called "angle wing" that renders them unable to fly for the rest of their lives.
