Mayor's Message

City Council Briefing

NOTICE OF BUDGET COMMITTEE MEETING

A public meeting of the Budget Committees of the **Yachats Urban Renewal Agency**, Lincoln County, State of Oregon, and the **City of Yachats** to discuss the budgets for the fiscal year July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014 will be held at the Civic Meeting Room, Yachats Commons. The meeting will take place on the 13th day of May 2013 at 5:00 p.m. The purpose of the meeting is to receive the budget message and to receive comment from the public on the budget. A copy of the budget document may be inspected or obtained on or after May 6, 2013 at City Hall, 441 Hwy 101 N., between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Any person

may appear at these meetings and discuss the proposed programs with the Budget Committee.

The **City of Yachats Budget Committee** will hold a **public hearing** on May 13, 2013 at 5:30 p.m. in the Civic Meeting Room of the Yachats Commons. The purpose of this hearing is to receive public comment on the possible uses of State Revenue Sharing Funds in the 2013-2014 budget year. Interested persons are invited to attend. Written testimony will be taken at the City Office, PO Box 345, Yachats, 97498. The meeting place is handicapped accessible. Those needing assistance please contact the City Recorder at 547-3565 before the meeting. The City of Yachats is an equal opportunity employer and service provider.



Public Hearing Scheduled

In an effort to keep the Yachats air clean for all, the City of Yachats placed a ban on outside burning, except for fires used only for ceremonial or cooking purposes and fueled only by commercially available fireplace or barbecue fuel or by wood, with the fire contained in a fireplace, barbecue grill, chinaria, or other similar structure or equipment (but not a burn barrel) specifically designed for outdoor ceremonial or cooking purposes and permitted by the Yachats Rural Fire Protection District.

As an alternative to burning, yard debris dump boxes were placed at the Public Works yard for citizens to dispose of the material they would have burned. Dahl has also started offering curbside pickup service to provide people with a way to get rid of the debris they collect when cleaning up their yard.

During certain times of the year, and for some residents with large yards and a lot of vegetation people may need more than the curbside containers, so City Council decided to bring back the yard debris dump box program this year. The yard debris dump boxes are back at Public Works and the City Council is seeking input from citizens on how that service should be paid for. Based on the cost for the service last summer the estimated cost for a year is \$6,000.

A public hearing has been scheduled for the May 9 City Council meeting at 2:00 p.m. to get that input.

Code Enforcement Report

I have worked closely with Wally Orchard, Chair of YIPS (Yachats Invasive Plant Sub-Committee) to eradicate the invasive weeds growing in Yachats. Wally has done an excellent job of preparing informational materials on invasive and organizing monthly volunteer opportunities to deal with these plants on public property and with permission, on private property. Wally and Christine are contemplating a move to be closer to new grandchildren. We will miss them and their contributions, but wish them the best.

Scotch Broom is coming into full bloom. There mostly yellow blooms are pretty obvious. There is also a sub-species that have rosier pink blossoms. The City has Weed Wrenches that are available for residents to use at no cost. Check with City Hall, Leon Sterner or myself and we can get you signed out. These devices work great and they literally pull the plant out of the ground, tap root and all. Right now the ground is still moist and the plants have not set seeds so they can be left on the ground to dry and wither. In a month or so, they will be producing seeds and even if pulled, all energy in the plant will go to seed production. The seeds are viable for 80 years and just need disturbed soil to sprout and then the cycle starts again.

We are in the lull between our spring break season and our full-blown summer tourist season. We are very fortunate that most of our vacation rental agencies are extremely conscientious with complying with all of our vacation rental ordinances. This year we are working toward the few who are in non-compliance that create the problems for our full time residents and me.



Our fair weather is allowing for needed repairs and maintenance on resident's homes and grounds. But just a reminder that a City Business License is required for any business doing

work within the city limits. You can help by just asking if they have a City Business License. 99% just don't know about the requirement and are very cooperative.

In a few short weeks, we will be hosting 100's of visitors coming to our welcoming little village which thrives during our wonderful busy season.

I hope it is a good summer for all.

Yachats Trails

Update

Heard on the Prospect Trail last month:

Hiker 1: So – If April showers bring May flowers, what do May flowers bring?

Hiker 2 (who appeared to be about eight years old and clearly proud of his knowledge): “Pilgrims!” (OK - Sorry... really... Spring can make one a bit giddy...)

May flowers are definitely popping up along the trails throughout town and while not exactly a pilgrimage, the trails crew would like to invite everyone in the community to make the trek to a very special event coming up on June 1st. On that day – [National Trails Day](#) – we will officially dedicate the new Ya'Xaik (*pronounced* YAH + gargled h + long I + hard k) Trail. Thanks to the outstanding cooperation and efforts of the U.S. Forest Service, the Angell Job Corps' Urban Forestry program, area land owners and many dedicated trails crew volunteers, the final leg of this beautiful 1.3 mile loop is finished and ready to dazzle both local and out of town visitors.

The theme of this year's National Trails Day is “Interpretation” and a number of interpretive opportunities are planned to explore the natural, historical and cultural stories behind the scenery that surrounds us. The Ya'Xaik name itself comes from the only known village name of the Alsea people who lived in this area, honoring their long and thriving presence in this special place. Robert Kentta, Cultural Resources Director and Tribal Council Member with the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians will be on hand to talk about the trail's name and First Nation's history in the Yachats area.

At 11:30 a.m., prior to the dedication ceremony, State Parks ranger Brian

Fowler will lead a 90 minute interpretive tour to the dedication site titled *A Guided Hike Through Time and Culture on the Historic 804 Trail*. (Watch for more information about the departure point and route for the tour, coming soon.)


Following the dedication ceremony, tours of the new trail will feature interpretive stopping points along the way staffed by U.S. Forest Service seasonal interpreters. And finally, a reception at the Overleaf Lodge's Event Center will include a number of informational displays and learning opportunities as well.

The dedication itself will take place at 1:00 p.m. at the east end of Diversity Drive – site of the Fistera Gardens Apartments trail access point. We expect a number of local, state, tribal and federal representatives to attend. Due to the size of the event, we are asking that attendees plan to park in the north lot of the Commons where, starting at 12:30, shuttle service will be available to and from the dedication site. (Some limited parking at the Overleaf Lodge Events Center will also be available for people with special accessibility requirements. Please contact Joanne Kittel (jnkittel@peak.org or 541-961-8374) to make arrangements for this option.) For anyone who doesn't plan to join Brian Fowler's pre-dedication tour but would like to hike from the Commons, you can take the wetlands trail behind the Commons to the 804 and walk north to the Overleaf Lodge. A new trail marker at the South end of the Overleaf will lead you to highway 101 where trails crew members will assist you in crossing the road to the dedication site. It is roughly a 30 minute hike from the Commons to the dedication site.



Following the dedication you are invited to hike the trail from the dedication site north to the Gerdemann Botanical Preserve footpath, down the footpath and on across Highway 101 for a post-dedication reception at the Overleaf Lodge Event Center. (Or you can go directly to the Event Center or catch a shuttle back to the Commons.) For those who choose to hike the new section of trail between Fistera Gardens and the Gerdemann preserve please be aware that it includes easy to moderate terrain and incorporates several short flights of stairs.

Stunning scenery, great company and wide ranging opportunities to learn more about the natural, historical, cultural and recreational surroundings that make Yachats such a special place... this day will include them all! We hope you will join this exciting event celebrating a tremendous new asset to our community and those who come to visit. As

**YIPS! News
(Yachats Invasive Plants Subcommittee)**

The most recent YIPS! foray was on Saturday, April 20, when we pulled spurge laurel in and around the Yachats Memorial Park. Aaron Duzik, who is in charge of invasive weeds at the Lincoln Soil and

Water Conservation District, led the operation. He had meticulously flagged many clumps of the offenders before we started, so we had no trouble tracking them down.

Spurge laurel is an ornamental plant that has escaped from the gardens in that area and invaded the nearby forest. All parts of the plant are toxic, and the sap can cause severe skin and eye irritations. Check out the attached photo of spurge laurel. If you discover any of these plants locally, please notify Wally or Don. After 2½ hours of hard work with blessedly beautiful weather, we decided to call it a day and adjourn to the Drift Inn for some much needed sustenance.



At this time of year everything green is growing strongly, weeds especially so. Scotch Broom is starting to flower and new shoots of knotweed are springing up. And

let's not forget about blackberry, ivy, morning glory and clematis. Even if you can't join us on our monthly weed pulls, you can help by controlling any of those weeds that you find on your patch of ground. Most of them spread by seed, so every plant that is pulled and doesn't produce seed helps prevent their spread.




Yachats Lunch Bunch

On the front page of the Metro section of the Oregonian last month, there was an article about efforts to increase tourism in rural areas. The Rural Tourism Studio (RTS) program, funded and sponsored the Oregon Department of Tourism/Travel Oregon, was featured, with special emphasis on how the project is playing out for South Lincoln County (Seal Rock,

Waldport, and Yachats). Because other small communities in the state have already gone through the RTS training, we have been able to benefit, adopting some really good ideas for our own area.

One of these good ideas is the “We Speak” program, developed by the Oakridge RTS. Our program is directed by Bev Wilson from the Yachats Area Chamber and Visitor Center and funded by a Lincoln County Economic Development grant. The idea is that people are the best ambassadors for an area. The program trains them to answer visitors’ questions: What kind of whales are out there? How do you catch a crab? How do you cook it? Can I rent a kayak? Where is the Amanda Trail? Who was Amanda? The people most likely to be asked those questions are the “front-line” workers—the wait staff, desk clerks, grocery store cashiers, visitor center volunteers, gas station attendants and so on. Each presentation is videotaped and made available to everyone who comes into contact with tourists.

Each of us can be a “We Speak” expert in something. We all know how cool it is to go on vacation and get to know people in the area we’re visiting. We love to ask them for tips on where the locals go. Our visitors feel the same about us!



However, sometimes we forget how we want to be treated when we travel. When the Oregonian article was posted online on OregonLive.com, there were some negative comments about tourism. I

may be the marketing director for GoYachats, but I know that YOU are the best marketing person for our town. We get a lot from tourism—not just the transient room tax which pays for most of our city services, but the economic foundation that provides jobs, supports the restaurants we like to patronize, and allows all our delightful retail stores to make it through the lean winter months.



Summer is on its way and with it comes the influx of visitors. If you feel a little irritated because you have to wait for a table or there is a line of traffic from Florence to Newport, remember that those visitors are essential to the well-being of our town.
