Mayor's Message

So, it's about a quarter to eleven on Eclipse Day, and I'm reporting my first reactions to the celestial event, just as many of you are doing at this moment. I guess one of the biggest questions is: where were the crowds? As I stood outside the C&K Market with around 30 people, we kept hearing that it was really foggy in Waldport and maybe on up the County. But WE SAW IT! Thanks to our City Manager and so many of our business community who prepared for the predicted chaos, but thankfully, the chaos was the one that never happened.

As many of you already know, especially if you took part in the City's process of interviewing and then selecting our new City Manager, I have been out of town for the past week or so. I needed to be with a family member who is experiencing a difficult health challenge. Before leaving, I was in contact with each of three candidates for City Manager, and informed the City Council that I was supportive of whatever choice they made.

I am sure that quite a few of you already know of the heartwarming experience those of us were blessed to have, as we were standing up publicly in support of Charlottesville, Virginia, and the rejection of all forms of white supremacy. Two women from Charlottesville happened to drive through town as we were standing at the edge of the highway. They were in grief for their home city and were astounded to see the Yachats response. They shared tear-filled embraces with each of us, and said that they would remember Yachats for the rest of their lives. We, too, will remember them and, of course, we invited them back!

A very interesting conversation has been going on for some time now concerning vegetation along Highway 101, as it stretches between the Newport Bridge and the Lane County Line. For the past ten years or so, there has been an agreement between the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT), and the Concerned Citizens for Clean Air (CCCA) and we have had almost no pesticide spraying on this section of highway for that period.

ODOT and CCCA understood this to be a pilot project to study what effect this policy might have. This year ODOT decided to end the project but also to not close the door to the good results it had. ODOT also decided that if there was to be some continuation of a cooperative agreement, it had to be not with a private agency such as CCCA, but with a governmental agency, such as Lincoln County and/or the cities.

At present, the cities of Newport, Waldport, and Yachats are determining the ways we can best support this future project, which will be to have pollinator plants all along the highway corridor, to support the great need to encourage pollination, so needed for the life of nature in our region. Stay tuned to further details, as we work on this.

City Manager hired; formal vote Sept. 6

The recruitment firm, Prothman Co., received 21 applications for the Yachats City Manager position. Following a review of qualifications and preliminary interviews, they invited five candidates for a final interview. Three were scheduled for interviews, but one withdrew this past week.

There was a meet and greet event Sunday afternoon, with both candidates. More than 50 residents talked with the candidates and then provided written reviews for the Council.

The Council interviewed the applicants in a public meeting Monday morning. Tours were provided for the applicants by three residents, and tour guides shared with the Council a summary of their impressions. There was also an opportunity for City staff to meet both applicants and talk.

The Council then deliberated in executive session, reviewed resumes, background checks, letters of reference, and the written citizen comments from the meet-and-greet session. The Council unanimously agreed to offer the position to Shannon Beaucaire, with a formal vote Sept. 6. She accepted their preliminary offer, to start Oct. 1.

Ms. Beaucaire, who earned her juris doctorate from Northwestern School of Law in Portland OR, has operated a consulting service in Albuquerque NM for the past 15 years, during which she served the City of Albuquerque as a division manager in the legal department. She also served the New Mexico Supreme Court as a statewide manager. She has worked specifically with citizen-oriented teams, organizational development, strategic planning and organizational development.

She will replace the first-ever City Manager for the City of Yachats, Joan Davies, who retired early this year, as many public employees did, in response to legislative action concerning PERS retirement accounts. She will be available part-time for a short period, to assist in the transition of a number of major projects already in the works, including the south reservoir site development and the remodeling of the old bank building to house the Yachats Library.

ODOT article in reference to sidewalks From Sheila Lyons, ODOT Project Engineer

You've probably seen that spots of your beautiful new streetscape project were being torn up again.

The City of Yachats recently put in sidewalks between Ocean View and 7th Street, using a grant from the Oregon Department of Transportation. Unfortunately, the end result didn't meet some of the ADA accommodation requirements that ODOT must enforce. Those portions are being replaced, such as some curb ramps and other features.

While most people we've heard from have been thrilled with the new look and feel of the project area, we have heard directly from a few concerned about places where improvements were needed. Our inspection of the site supported the changes.

It can be painful to see brand new concrete features being re-done. However, the final result will make navigation in a wheelchair safer and easier. We think that's a worthy goal.

Art Banner Auction and Reception **Sept. 23 for hanging street banners**

The art banners hanging on the new lamp posts and above our new sidewalks will be coming down in mid-September. "But why?" you ask. "They are so beautiful, why can't they stay flying all year long?" The answer is that the art banners are now headed for a new adventure.

On Sept. 23, the Friends of the Yachats Commons will celebrate the banner project with a silent auction and reception. The 28 banners, designed and painted by local artists, will be on display in The Commons so everyone can view them close up, with the opportunity to bid on a favorite and take one home for your own display. To celebrate at the reception, FYC will provide an array of finger foods, beer and wine for sale, and music by our local 'They Went That-Away'.

Proceeds from the silent auction will fund the continuation of the art banner project in 2018. This year, the project was funded by a grant from Lincoln County Cultural Coalition, organized and led by Yachats artist Michael Guerriero. Please join us Saturday, Sept. 23, 5-7 pm at The Commons for an evening filled with art, music, food and friends.

FOG = fats, oils and grease

All too often, fats, oils, dressing and grease are disposed of improperly during food preparation and kitchen clean-up. When poured down sinks or floor drains, FOG can accumulate and reduce the capacity which can potentially cause a blockage in the sewer system.

In severe cases, blockage can lead to sewage backups into homes and businesses, and sewers that overflow onto roadways and property, which may then eventually flow into local waterways.



"Fat Trappers" and bag refills can be purchased at City Hall for a very nominal price.

Please do your part to minimize the amount of FOG that you put down the drain. FOG increases the existing financial cost associated with the operation and maintenance of the City sanitary sewer system. You can make a difference.

Remember the time the Yachats Ladies Club went topless?



A look back at Yachats history is written by Sandy Dunn

The Ladies Club building was set on the current site in 1929. Electricity was not added until 1932; restrooms and kitchen were added in 1933; rods and turnbuckles to brace the roof were installed in 1940. The roof was repaired just about every year. In 2006, the roofing needed to be replaced and the club started fundraising to remodel the kitchen. In July 2007, the building contents were stored and a roof replacement project started.

Then the Ladies Club went topless!



The roofing and support beams were removed, new trusses and roof went up, and the "roofing" project turned into a major building remodel. The south wall fell in, due to dry rot, and the flooring was compromised when rains hit the roofless building. "While we are at it" projects started. With many hours of volunteer labor and financial donations from neighbors, community members, people walking by and our members' husbands and partners, we moved back in the building in August 2008. In 2009, we replaced the building siding, got a new foundation and had what looked like a whole new building.

Our thanks go to Joe West, volunteer coordinator and project head; Dick Springsteen, contractor; and many hard working volunteers. We are also grateful to Siletz Tribal Charitable Contribution Fund for two grants that helped pay for the roof trusses and the siding.

If the book is in the Library, you will receive a call telling you it is available for pick-up. Otherwise, you will be called when the book is returned.

Another wonderful service Yachats Library offers is ordering books on request. Ask the librarian if you can request a book, and your suggestion will be written in the request notebook. If the book meets the order criteria (*time since publication, general interest of other library patrons, etc.*), it will be ordered and made available.

Yachats Vacation Rental (VR) information about proposed changes

The City Council has approved a number of modifications for vacation rentals. The council will vote on the ordinance during their September meetings. It may require two votes to finalize.

The following information is in response to a number of questions being raised:

- ◆ The City Council voted August 2 to approve all the recommended VR changes. The VR vote in September will be about whether the proposed ordinance changes accurately reflect what has been approved.
- ◆ The VR ordinance changes go into effect 30 days after the ordinance is approved by the council, unless otherwise designated.
- ◆ Existing VR license holders will be allowed to retain their licenses as long as they renew them at the end of each year in a timely manner.
- ◆ There is no "property right" to operate a business (vacation rental) in a residential zone. That is generally what zoning is designed to regulate. Yachats has chosen to use a business license process instead.
- ◆ VR rules about parking for vacation rentals only apply to vacation rentals.
- ◆ No City Council member has any interest or financial involvement in vacation rentals.
- ◆ All Yachats vacation rentals must be managed by a local property management company to retain the license.
- ◆ Failure to maintain current and accurate owner phone numbers, e-mail addresses will result in the loss of a VR license.
- ◆ Property owners and their guests have to abide by the same restrictions for parking
- ◆ Oregon law stipulates that a percentage of the VR tax is dedicated for visitor amenities. The council has defined a portion of library services, trails construction & maintenance, parking, and event marketing as examples of services eligible for visitor amenities funding. State law specifically excludes city infrastructure like water, sewer and streets improvements from this funding source.
- ◆ Looking at the number of VR licenses as a percent of population finds Newport at 1.29% (135/10,393); Lincoln City at 5.42% (473/8,722) and Yachats at 19% (133/700).
- ◆ The number of current licenses shall not exceed 135. After the ordinance is approved, no new licenses will be awarded until the number of licenses drops below 125, which then becomes the new cap.
- ◆ Vacation Rental licenses cannot be transferred to a new owner. New property owners must apply for a license and the license count must be under the cap for a new license to be issued.
- ◆ The City has exceeded the minimum requirements for public notification including a well-attended public meeting where over 70 people attended on July 12 in Commons multi-purpose room.
- ◆ The final licensing fee structure recommendation was the direct result of a written suggestion made by a current VR owner.
- ◆ Vacation rental licenses generated \$13,860 for 2016, while the City spent approximately \$30,000 on VR code enforcement for a code enforcement officer, which does not include any administrative staff time for licensing and tax payments or any of the database work to track and manage VR licenses. Current licensing income doesn't come close to paying for related operational costs.
- ◆ A \$300,000 home pays \$53 in taxes a year to the city for general government expenses. A \$500,000 home pays \$85.50. Take a close look at your last property tax statement from Lincoln County. Look for the line that says "City of Yachats", about half way down the list.
- ◆ The Council has authorized the development of a new complaint system to make it easier for citizens to make complaints and to improve monitoring, tracking and reporting of complaint activity. Much of this information will be public.
- ◆ During the last Comprehensive Plan update, residents were asked a series of questions. The responses to these questions guide current public policy decisions in Yachats. If you examine the responses link, you will see that Preserving Livability could be interpreted as our highest priority. These questions define what is important to residents and their relative weighting. Library link for this document:
