Mayor's Message

For the final newsletter of Mayor Smith's administration, I conducted a brief interview with both Mayor Smith and Mayor-elect Brean. Here's what they had to say:

Mayor Smith

What were some of your accomplishments?

Oversight of the largest infrastructure project (the wastewater treatment plant) in the City's history has to come at the top of the list. Improved communication is a very close second. I fully realize that I can not (and do not) consider any of these as my accomplishments; they are all results of collaborative efforts among many people through the years. Projects that have come "under my watch" include in no particular order are: Community celebrations; Yachats Safety Patrol; a mediated settlement to the 804 Trail controversy; completion of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan (thanks to the many hours spent by the Planning Commission); Emergency Management; creation of an Urban Renewal District; enacting a 5% Prepared Food and Beverage tax to help pay for the new Waste Water Treatment Plant; the Green Ribbon Committee; staff reorganization; a Capital Improvement Plan; creation of a Finance Committee; increased water efficiency; increased collaboration with government agencies such as the Sheriff's Department and State Parks Department;

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and commissions that function fully and productively.

Were there goals you hoped to meet but were not able to? If so, why not?

Former Councilor Jerry Kraft, a very wise man, reminded us a number of years ago that goals are on-going and never attained. Objectives, however, may be. I hoped in the beginning to maintain my optimism and my deep hopes for this community. I like to think that Yachats is a better place because of my ten years of service.

Looking back, what sticks out most in your mind during of your tens years of public service? Highlights, lowlights?

Having been elected to City Council in the first place was hugely exciting for me. Of course, being "recruited" to run for Mayor was a major highlight. The recent August 17th celebration was as deeply touching for me as anything I have experienced in my public life. Seeing consensus in action and respect among elected officials and with the public are highlights for me.

The only "lowligh" during my ten years has been the unwarranted hatred for what I "represent." Some of that "goes with the territory." Would I do it all again? Absolutely!

What advice would you give Mayor-elect Brean? What would you advise against doing?

While I am convinced that Mayor-elect Brean does not *need* my advice, I would suggest that he be: accessible; available; be a good listener; recognize the excellent staff working for the City; and remain sensitive to the issues that affect Yachadians. He is seasoned and will be excellent, I am quite sure.

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Mayor-elect Brean

Why did you decide to run for Mayor of Yachats?

Because some people asked me to, because I am naïve enough to think I can be of service, and because I am experienced enough to know that naiveté is a great asset. Without naiveté people would believe in the impossibility of the task rather than just going out and achieving it.

Tell us a little bit about your background?

I'm a lover of all things out-doors. As a consequence I studied wildlife management and pursued a career as a park ranger. I'm passionate about preserving natural resources and sharing their re-energizing power with others. That led me to want to have the greatest impact I could on protecting and improving parks, so I promoted and kept promoting. I finished a career with California State Parks at the highest level one can achieve without being a close personal friend of the Governor. In the process I was able to participate in what I loved while learning the functions and processes of government, management principles, leadership skills, and group process, among other things. I received the Department's Olmsted Award for Leadership and Vision.

Do you have your own agenda or do you plan on picking up where Mayor Smith left off?

The City of Yachats is in really good shape thanks to the efforts of Mayor Smith and outgoing Council members Evans and Wulff, as well as those of the members remaining. So I guess it's safe to say the new Council will pick up where those that went before us left off. There will be new challenges awaiting us, and the new Council will start with what we've been given (grateful that it's not a big mess) and refine a vision that keeps us moving in a positive direction. There has been a lot of work done on describing a desirable future for Yachats with the Vision 2020 effort and the Comprehensive Plan. Our first job will be to refine that vision into a useable tool for the Council, a basis from which to make decisions, and then carry on the day to day work of our community.

What do you plan on doing the same/differently than Mayor Smith?

I hope to achieve the same level of dedication and devotion to duty. I know we share a sense of the importance of the Council's job and a desire to respond efficiently to the needs of the community while maintaining the "sense of place" that makes Yachats unique. We both are inclusive in our approach to problem solving. I suppose there are many things that will look very much the same.

There are, of course, differences in our experience and background that will lead to differences in style, approach, experiential knowledge banks, and historical perspective. There are some things I may do better, and there are undoubtedly some things I won't be as good at. There are also two other new members to the Council that will add their talents, knowledge and experience to the process. Therefore, I'm sure that there will be minor differences in style, and personality.

There are challenging times facing the entire nation: environmental issues, sustainability, social concerns, and economic concerns to name a few. Our village will not be immune from those challenges. Since I was asked to consider running for mayor, I've come to realize that the circumstances of my life have inadvertently prepared me to be of assistance in facing those challenges. I am somewhat uniquely qualified to facilitate not only the administrative functions of the City, but also the community dialogue that will see us through the present and coming turbulence.

As far as the actual differences are concerned, I think I will be discovering the differences between a Council led by Mayor Smith and one led by Ron Brean at the same time everyone else does.

Do you have any questions for Mayor Smith?

I have lots of questions for Mayor Smith. I have new questions everyday. I intend to chase her down periodically and ask them.

The next few years will be more difficult for the City than those of my tenure. I hope that the structural improvements this Council leaves behind: CIP, the food and beverage tax, and the Finance Committee, will help the next Council cope with the financial issues which seem certain to arise. I also hope that we will continue to make our own fun and help other along the way.

Public Works & Streets Commission

When Oregon Department of Environmental Quality ordered Yachats to upgrade its failing sewer plant, many in town were dismayed at the impact the projected cost of more than \$6,000,000 would have on the property-owning tax payers of the city. Sue Smith was not dismayed. She asked the Public Works and Streets Commission, made up of volunteer citizens, to review sewer rates and costs. This we did and recommended that rates be adjusted upward, with most of the adjustment applying to businesses that were heavy users of the system. Sue and the City

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Council implemented our recommendations quickly. However, we also pointed out that these adjustments would fall far short of the revenues required to pay for the new plant.

Interested community members recommended that another group be formed specifically to find additional sources of revenue. Sue quickly formed the Green Ribbon Committee. The members of the committee identified multiple potential income sources and recommended them to the Mayor. Sue seized on many of these recommendations and shepherded them through the City Council. Included were the creation of an Urban Renewal District and a Prepared Food and Beverage Tax. Today, Yachats has mechanisms in place that are paying for the new sewer plant improvements without heavy additional burdens on the property owners.

It has been a good year at YYFAP. The after school Recreation Plus and Summer programs, Early Childhood Education and Parent Support Programs, Classes and Educational Support, and Teen and Community Service programs continue to serve a great many in our community. During the July-September quarter, over 300 children and adults participated in these programs, with upwards of 150 volunteers donating their time to assist our board and staff, and 6 other organizations collaborating with YYFAP for mutual benefit.

As most of you are aware this level of activity has left YYFAP feeling pinched for space. The City of Yachats has generously allowed us use of the Commons basement free of charge. We do rent additional space upstairs for our preschool and for other activities as needed. eBill/ePay Update

The City of Yachats introduced its new eBill/ePay program this past month. We had a great first month with a total of 67 people registering to use the program. We are excited to get the program rolling even further and hope to have even more people register in the months to come. This program allows the City to save money and time while at the same time helping conserve resources.

This new program is very versatile. Customers can view, print and pay your water/sewer bill in just a few minutes. The program allows customers to receive their bills online or customers can choose to do both receive their bills online and make payments. Customers who have multiple accounts can create one profile and add all their accounts.

This new program is quick, easy, and free to use. All customers need is a copy of their most recent City of Yachats water/sewer bill(s) for the account(s) you wish to register. Locate the five-digit PIN located in the upper left area above the name and mailing address on the bill. Log on to www.ci.yachats.or.us and click on the eBill/ePay link and complete the registration form. After the first of each month registrants will receive an e-mail notification letting them know their new bill ready.



Emergency Supplies and Equipment Drive in Yachats

The City of Yachats is requesting that our citizens consider donating emergency supplies and equipment for our two storage units for use after a disaster. One unit has been placed near the water reservoir on Radar Road and the other unit is placed temporarily on the west side of Bank of the West building. It will eventually be placed on the south side of the bridge.

The City will continue to park this unit in its temporary position until after the holidays. In January, the City will announce the dates that they will collect donations of emergency supplies and equipment for the storage unit and will continue to collect these supplies for approximately three months. It is of utmost importance to have needed supplies available to all of our citizens after a disaster.

Within the next two months please take the opportunity look around your home, look for bargains in the newspaper, or to look in your pantry and start a box of items for the emergency supplies and equipment list. The list is very specific for survival items and it is as follows: tarps, blankets, fishing gear, camp type dishes or paper plates and plastic ware, collapsible water containers, air mattresses, flashlights, large garbage bags, diapers and other baby items, pet food, radios, lanterns, folding camp furniture including chairs and tables, clean storage tubs, camp kitchen equipment including camp stoves and the fuel, camp coffee pots, toilet paper, paper towels, tape, rope, shovels and bleach. Questions about emergency items can be directed me at (541) 547-4934.

These items will be collected on a Saturday in January. The South Lincoln County CERT Team will be available at the storage units to check in the supplies. LET'S BE PREPARED NOW!
