Planning Department

**LAND PARTITION
APPLICATIONS**

This is the fifth of eight descriptions of different types of land use and building permit applications that the city processes.

What is a Land Partition? A land partition is dividing a single parcel of land into two or three parcels of land. The difference between a partition and a subdivision is a subdivision divides a single parcel of land into four or more parcels.

Land Partition Requirements - In order to partition land into two or three parcels each parcel must meet the standards of the underlying zoning district. For example, to partition land in the R-1 Residential Zone each parcel must have a minimum lot size of 7,500 square feet, a minimum 60 foot lot width, and a minimum 80 foot lot depth. Each parcel must have legal access in accordance with minimum standards. If there are existing buildings, the buildings must meet minimum setback requirements. There are other partition standards described in Section 9.56 of the Yachats Municipal Code.

The Process - A property owner files an application and \$200 fee with the City. Once city staff deems the application complete, notice of the Planning Commission public hearing is published in the paper and mailed to surrounding property owners. A staff report is prepared prior to the public hearing. The Planning Commission receives public testimony and makes a tentative decision at the public hearing. If the Planning Commission grants tentative approval the applicant must hire a land surveyor to prepare the partition map and have it recorded with the Lincoln County Surveyor's Office.

History of Partition - From 2002-2008, the City has approved 14 of 17 partition applications.

Public Works
Department

2008 has been a very busy year for the Public Works Department.

As if this writing, the Wastewater Plant project is close to 95% complete. The new treatment facility is scheduled to start up in this month and two of the four collection system pump stations are operational with the other two scheduled to be online by the end of this month.

The new Public Works building is scheduled to be completed by the end of this month also, and will provide space inside for Public Works equipment. We have been operating out of two 40' CONEX containers for the past 18 months and everyone is excited to have a permanent roof over their heads.

Electrical and operational upgrades have been completed at the Water Treatment Plant to keep up with Federal and State requirements for drinking water.

Monitoring is taking place on the Yachats River to follow the agreement with the State to exercise the City water rights.

Waterline replacement and upgrades have been completed with the installation of 1000' of 6" Class 200 pipe on Highway 101. We also have plans to upgrade Reeves Circle which will provide increased pressure and fire flow. All projects have been identified in the Yachats Water Master Plan.

The Storm Water Master Plan Addendum has been completed and Public Works has started on projects identified in the plan.

In November and December, Public Works will be cleaning water reservoirs. Flushing of distribution lines will take place between November 17th and November 21st.



Public Works & Streets
Commission Report

A major function of the Public Works & Streets Commission is to ensure water and sewer rates are adequate to meet the City's financial requirements. The Commission continues to monitor, each month, the actual revenues received from water and sewer billing, comparing the revenues to projected numbers as well as City expenses. The Commission feels current rates are adequate, but may require revision if the projected financial recession has a marked negative impact on revenues.

A Storm Drain Study is under way to ensure Yachats' storm drains are adequate to handle heavy winter rain events, and if not, where improvements are needed. The study will be presented to the City Council in November, along with a request that a consultant be hired to prepare a System Development Charge (SDC) recommendation.

Commission members set up the City's annual Clean Sweep event this past June, and Commission members assisted the community in filling three large dumpsters with discards.

Eight new public litter containers are soon to be set in place by Dahl Disposal. The PW&S members recommended that City Council accept Dahl's generous offer to furnish them free of charge.

Commission members continue to monitor the City's water quality reports from Public Works Director, John McClintock. Members recently requested that periodic water tests monitor the level of aluminum. Director McClintock has compiled the data and reported that there are no detectable aluminum levels.

At the City Council's request, the Commission has identified two State publications that can be used to educate visitors on bicycle and pedestrian safety, as well as applicable laws for vehicle drivers. The Council has been asked to procure a quantity of each brochure for city-wide distribution.

ment in Oregon is the principle that the public should have free and open access to public records and the process of governance. This is why Oregon has an open meeting law that requires that public bodies like city councils and commissions conduct their business discussion with the public present and that a record be maintained for anyone that wants to review the discussion.

The City of Yachats maintains records of all public documents and makes these available at City Hall. If someone wants access to older meeting minutes, studies, reports, agendas, and other public records, they have to go to City Hall and request them. A staff person goes to a filing cabinet or a box and sorts through a stack of documents to locate the requested material.

Today, there is a better way. The City of Yachats now offers a searchable database option for public records. All that is required is a computer with Internet access. The link for the City's new document search service is <http://YachatsDocuments.info>. If someone doesn't have a computer or Internet access, they can use the public computers at the Yachats Public Library. The volunteers will soon be trained to assist people with record searches. Links to the search site have been added to the Library public machine desktops.

Records for 2008 are being added to the database and the plan is to add documents back to the year 2000. A limited number of older records will be added as time permits. The site also includes on-line instructions for searches, examples, and a frequently asked questions (FAQ) section. Every effort has been made to make the search process logical and natural. Because documents are fully searchable, you can query a name, a street, a date, or any unique word or phrase present in the document. There are currently 19 categories users can fill in to filter their searches and they may use one or a combination of categories. The more filters included, the narrower the search becomes.

Commons Management Task Force

One of the important responsibilities of the City Council is to find ways to efficiently handle the City's business. From time to time it is useful to evaluate the structure and staffing of the City's various programs. Do we have the right positions? Are the reporting relationships appropriate? Are we doing the work right and are we doing the right work? It is neither a glamorous nor easy task, but one that any responsible managing body should do once in a while. Our Council recently revisited that responsibility.

A part of that review process led to an exploration of the primary purpose and function of the Yachats Commons. Is it primarily an events center or is it primarily a community center? How do events centers differ from community centers? How is the workload different between the two? Which management model or use pattern should we seek for the Commons? What is working well and what should perhaps be done differently?

Through the Parks and Commons Commission, these topics were explored in great detail. The Commission's recommendations were passed on to the Council. The Council decided that the Commons is a very valuable resource as a community center. From time to time, when not being used in that capacity, it also serves as an events venue. It was not felt that marketing and promoting the facility were essential for the Commons to achieve its primary purpose. More crucial are the tasks of assisting in the community's use of the Commons and "managing" the events that find their way to us. As a result, the Council opted to discontinue the Commons Coordinator position which was largely responsible for marketing and promotion, and explore other means of fulfilling the Commons potential, and need for coordination and management.

The Commission recommended the establishment of a task force to consider how this change should be undertaken. The Council accepted that

recommendation and appointed members of the Parks & Commons Commission, representatives of the non-profit Friends of the Yachats Commons, Yachats Youth and Family Activities Program advocates, and interested citizens to the project. The members of the Commons Task Force includes: Debbie Jackson, Greg Jones, Cy Kauffman, Robin Link, Don Niskanen, Kathy Perkins, Greg Scott, Sue Smith, Leon Sterner, and me. Our mission is to shepherd the Commons through the transition using existing staff and volunteers, and formulating a management strategy for the Commons into the future.

As we have moved from the former model toward a different one, the Task Force has been pleased with the smoothness of the transition. City staff and volunteers from Friends of the Yachats Commons have spectacularly risen to the challenge. There have been no “hiccups” that have not been expeditiously resolved, and in most cases things are running smoother than ever. The Commons Calendar is being updated regularly and is available online at www.ci.yachats.or.us. The rental request form and standard rental contract have been improved. Processes have been reviewed, tweaked, or invented to make the rental process smoother than ever before. Volunteer staffing has been well coordinated and has proven to be available when necessary. On-call volunteers have been provided with a cell phone so that users have access to help in the event of unforeseen glitches. We have also improved the process for getting feedback from the Commons users and updated the Commons Policy Manual. In other words, our first priority (an interim operating plan to transition to a new model as smoothly as possible) has been successfully achieved.

What remains is to recommend a staffing and management structure for addressing the various workloads associated with a successfully operating community center. We have worked through the task list and begun grouping the chores into functional components. At our next meeting we will hopefully finalize a workload organization chart and begin evaluating various methods of addressing the identified work for the long term. We recognize that, as always, there will be a strong element of volunteerism in helping to manage the Commons. Therefore we will be seeking to better define the volunteer recruiting and training program to be sure that the needs of Commons users can be met. We

are hopeful that we will make a set of recommendations to the Council in the near future.
